Happy New Year!

No, I don't have the date wrong. This past Sunday, the last Sunday in November, we began a new church year and a new lectionary cycle when we began the Advent Season.

Advent is a season that consists of four Sundays; the four Sundays prior to Christmas Day which this year also falls on a Sunday. In the Sundays leading up to Christmas Eve we reflect on the meaning of Christ's Good News: hope, peace, joy, and love when we light a candle.

In addition, this year we will be following the UMC Advent-Christmas season series which themes are, in order, *Watch, Turn, See, Dream, Peace, Word* and *Reveal*. The following are how the themes are summarized on our global website umc.org.

Advent 1: Watch - The series begins where Advent begins, with the call of Jesus to his disciples to stay on watch for the fulfillment of all things.

Advent 2: Turn - Becoming aware of the end of the universe as we know it that Christ will bring about, we are invited to repent, to turn from our attachments to the powers of death and destruction in this age, and live out of the Spirit-led mission of the coming reign of God.

Advent 3: See - Once we have turned toward the fulfillment God intends, we begin to be able to see the world and treat others in it in a new way.

Advent 4: Dream - Even as we begin to see God's way of compassion and mercy, we also–like Joseph – come to acknowledge our reliance on God communicating with us and transforming us, not just in our waking, conscious lives, but in our sleeping, unconscious lives as well.

Christmas Eve: Peace - Whether in dreams or visions of angels, we see and hear and join the chorus of the heavenly host announcing the birth of Jesus as a sign of peace to all people of good will.

Christmas Day: Word - In a Service of the Word today, we contemplate the mystery of the Word made flesh and dwelling among us.

Epiphany Sunday: Reveal - The constellations reveal the birth of Messiah, and the powers of this world are revealed for their self-preservation and violent resistance to the saving work of God.

I look forward to sharing this Advent and Christmas season with you all again.



Update from the Staff Pastor Parish Relations Committee (SPPRC) by Deb Elliott, Chair

In response to the unexpected resignation of Carl Shepard, Assistant to the Pastor, **SPPRC** has been diligently exploring options and next steps. In consultation with Rich Weihling, District Superintendent, and in agreement with Pastor Margaret, a ministry improvement plan has been established to help us determine the best option for SUMC.

As you are aware, Pastor Margaret is a half time Pastor (20-25 hours per week), as assigned by the UMC Conference based on our church size and financial situation. SUMC decided to hire a 1/4 time (10 hours per week) Assistant to the Pastor to provide additional services such as preaching 1X a month, leading Bible Study, helping the congregation establish a vision and direction, and establishing a visitation committee. Carl Shepard served in that capacity for a little over 2 years. Transitioning to a 1/2 time Pastor at SUMC has been a challenge on many levels, especially after always having full time pastors in the past. Expectations for how much time and what duties a part time pastor should devote to SUMC is varied among many of you and unfortunately has led to disappointment and frustration at times. **SPPRC** is cognizant of the tensions that have emerged and is dedicated to finding a resolution and agreed upon mutual decision regarding what ministry is best for SUMC.

The improvement plan is the first step in helping us to assess what is needed and desired here at SUMC so we can make the best decision. The goal is to make a determination by March 1, 2017 as to whether SUMC will hire a 1/4 time assistant or transition Pastor Margaret to 3/4 time. In response to an expressed desire to have more face-to-face time with Pastor Margaret and opportunity to get to know her better, the following action items will be implemented effective immediately:

1. Pastor Margaret will resume regular weekly office hours. Margaret will be in the office on Tuesday mornings between the hours of 10:30 am - 12:00 pm. Please feel free to stop by to say hello or see her if you have a pressing need. Pastor Margaret is always available to meet with you at another time by appointment as needed.

2. Pastor Margaret will be arriving to church by 9:30 am on Sunday mornings to prepare for worship. Margaret has requested quiet spiritual time prior to worship, but she will be joining us each Sunday for fellowship and welcomes time with all of you after worship. While I realize this may be the only time some of you get to see Pastor Margaret and you may wish to chat with her about personal needs, please make an appointment to meet with her at another time if your conversation may be lengthy so she has time to mingle with others.

3. Pastor Margaret will be sending out an email 2 times a month, or as necessary, to keep church members informed of upcoming events (baptisms, weddings, funerals, etc.), updates on Confirmation, updates from the Conference, community activities and events, updates on members who are in need of our prayers or any other information that she feels may be of interest to all of us. This will be in addition to the weekly wake ups and Carillon.

4. Pastor Margaret will attend UMW, Men's Breakfast and other church events, when her schedule permits, to connect with those groups on a more regular basis.

5. **SPPRC** will be coordinating small focus group meetings with church members to elicit feedback from all of you as we monitor progress and assess the needs of SUMC. As chair, I will also provide regular updates as appropriate.

In addition to the above, the following is in place to minimize gaps due to Carl's resignation:

- Worship Committee has established an interim plan to accommodate different worship experiences for the 3rd Sunday of each month while Pastor Margaret is leading Confirmation Class (Sundays when Carl was scheduled to preach). This will be an opportunity to learn from some of your fellow SUMC family or meet new people.
- Both Bible Study groups will continue to meet as scheduled and have established plans for meaningful discussion together.

I certainly understand and appreciate your uneasiness and apprehension as we embark on yet another transition time at SUMC. I respectively ask for your patience and support as we address areas of concern and explore the best options for ministry at SUMC. Please feel free to contact me or any of the SPPRC members at any time with questions, suggestions or concerns. Keep the faith.

YOUTH FOR CHRIST

Steve Prettyman, a neighbor of the Connors and Judy Swain, has dedicated 19 years to the ministry of *Youth for Christ*. He spoke recently for the Scotia Methodist Women's group and shared about his introduction to YFC as a teenager. At a young age, he finally accepted Jesus into his life. He talked about how God is always with us and how wonderful it is when you know He's really there, through good times and bad.

Steve spoke about bullying, isolation and suicide among teens. We know that this is not to be taken lightly, that it is real and it is ugly. He reiterated "Is teasing meant to be a gentle poke or a hard shove: how can you tell" issue that we, as adults need to translate and not dismiss as harmless. Or not to add to the problem by being a bully ourselves.

I kept thinking about how someone feels isolated in a room full of people and I had a flashback to high school. I felt isolated, not realizing until years later some of it came from shyness and some of the fact my interests lay in other directions from the 'popular' classmates. I just didn't know it then. Nor could I verbalize it. And therein lay one of today's biggest problems. Silence is not golden.

Steve said at the big group sessions, they do an exercise in a gym with everyone in a circle. One of the leaders has a list of 40 questions. No verbal answers are given. You answer the questions by taking two steps forward. The students look around and are amazed there are other students who feel the same way. Then they step back in the circle. After all the questions have been asked, the exercise is complete. Then the conversations begin between the students who thought they were alone with their feelings...and the healing begins. There are adults there also, to guide and help. (Note: Scotia is looking for male mentors for the middle school boys, so if you are interested, please call him and volunteer.)

I'm actually thankful I come from a different generation where there was no social media; no Facebook or Twitter and I couldn't poke anybody, except my little brother. Bullying, isolation and suicide is nothing new as we well know, but we, as fellow human beings, should be looking out for each other. – *Holly Russo*



I have been doing research into the origins of some of our music and Christmas songs in particular originated from interesting sources. A few involved inebriation and partying back in the day and others were inspired by the serenity of the moment; the exuberance of children building a snowman or as with White Christmas by Irving Berlin, reminiscing about an old-fashioned Christmas while he was in L.A. Carols imply more of a religious aspect to the season. *Silent Night*, (Stille Nacht, heilige Nacht) for example, is of German origin and was written by Franz Zaver Gruber, lyrics by Joseph Mohn. Mr. Gruber was looking up at the night sky and saw a bright star in the heavens and likened it to the Star of Bethlehem on Dec. 24, 1818 and composed the music. And here's a little tidbit I'm willing to bet you didn't know (gotta' love Wikipedia) but *White Christmas* (still the no. 1 best-selling single for the past 50 years) was broadcast on April 30, 1975 as a secret, pre-arranged signal precipitating the U.S. Evacuation of Saigon. Think about the words to some of these songs and read the fine print at the bottom of the page in the hymnal and you can usually find the author's/composer's name and when it was either written or published.
