Scotia-Glenville Food Pantry – We collect for the Scotia-Glenville Food Pantry, both food and cash, during service on the **second and fourth Sundays each month**. The food pantry, located at the City View Church, 12 Mohawk Avenue, Scotia provides a three (3) day supply of food to residents of Scotia-Glenville. The pantry is open Tuesdays 5:30 – 7:00 pm and Fridays 9:00 – 11:00 am. For information call 399-9426 and ask for Janice Cooper or call Tim Horn at 377-0372.

Bottles for Bread – Please continue to place your clean **refundable** containers in the red barrels. If you have a large quantity, pick-up can be arranged. All proceeds go to the Scotia-Glenville food pantry. To date you have donated over 4,800 containers. Thank you and stay hydrated.

Regional Food Bank – A great opportunity for fellowship with others from our church and a group from Bank of America. On the third Tuesday of each month we go to the Regional Food Bank to sort and repack products from various stores. We meet at the church to carpool at 2:00 and usually return there around 4:30. No long term commitment, join us whenever your schedule allows. Our next trip is **TUESDAY**, **January 19th**.

Box Tops for Education - Box tops for education can be found on some cereal boxes, yogurt containers and numerous other containers. If you are not giving yours to a school, please drop them off at church and we will donate them to local schools.

2015 MISSION COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT

Dec. 21, 2015

While we are called the Mission Team, the only mission trip the church has been involved with in the last seven years, was a five (5) day trip to help rebuild the Schoharie area in 2012. What we really are is a church doing outreach. And we are very good at doing outreach. Many of our members are very involved in the community doing their own outreach and their activities are not listed here. The following are the activities of our congregation:

Scotia-Glenville Food Pantry - The food pantry provides an emergency three day food supply to the needy in our community. The children collect donations twice a month during service. Through November you have donated \$1,614.16 and 277 pounds of food and personal hygiene products. Additionally, your Bottles-for-Bread donations have been redeemed for \$240.90. This brings the total cash given to the food pantry to \$1,854.06. We still have one month and over 500 bottles to be refunded to be added to the total.

Regional Food Bank of Northeast New York – The Food Bank collects large donations of food from the food industry and distributes it to charitable agencies serving hungry and disadvantaged people in 23 counties. From Plattsburgh to Newburgh, in urban, rural, and suburban communities, the Food Bank provides over 30 million pounds of food a year to 1,000 agencies. Join with us, it is a great opportunity for fellowship with others from our church and a group from Bank of America. On the third Tuesday of each month we go to the Regional Food Bank to sort and repack products from various stores. Over the last 10 months we have spent 70 person hours working there.

Salvation Army Luncheons – Under June Pelham's direction we prepare and serve lunch approximately six times a year at the Salvation Army location in Schenectady. Through November we did 6 luncheons serving 881 people. There was enough food left over for the Salvation Army to serve an additional 220 people. Ten different volunteers have been involved one or more luncheons.

SICM Summer Lunch Program – Under a federal grant, Schenectady Inner City Ministries (SICM) offers a free lunch to any child less than 18 years of age at 30 fixed sites (parks, churches, etc.) and a mobile van. We served at Hillhurst Park in Schenectady where in July, 20 of us distributed meals to 383 hungry children. A good time was had by all.

Union College Summer Lunch Program – Scotia does not meet the "needs" requirements for the federal government to authorize grant for a free lunch to any child less than 18 years of age. Union College, following the example of SICM, decided to provide free meals for the youth at Collins Park. We served there the first week of August. 27 of us distributed meals to 204 hungry children.

Union College Summer Lunch Food Preparation Program - This year Union College asked that the organization serving the food also help prepare it. 14 different people helped with the food preparation.

Opportunities for Additional Service - Both the Regional Food Bank and Salvation Army have asked us to come more often, so if we have others willing we can expand our service to either or both of them. The S-G food pantry could use one or two people to help serve their clients. Also, we could consider a mission trip, either on our own or with another church/conference. The Mission Committee is open to any suggestions.
