#### This is the Day of New Beginnings...

#### **SUMC IN MISSIONS**

Scotia-Glenville Food Pantry – We collect for the Scotia-Glenville Food Pantry, both food and cash, during service on the **second and fourth Sundays each month**. There are baskets in each corner of the sanctuary for food donations anytime. Cash will allow the food pantry to buy from the Regional Food Bank at reduced prices as well as those items they run short of. The pantry will use anything we donate but they always need personal hygiene products (soaps, shampoo, toilet paper, etc.) because people cannot purchase these items with food stamps.

**Bottles for Bread** — Please continue to place your clean **refundable** containers in the red barrels. If you have a large quantity, pick-up can be arranged. All proceeds go to the Scotia-Glenville food pantry.

**Regional Food Bank** – A great opportunity for fellowship with others from our church and a group from Bank of America. On the third Tuesday of each month we go to the Regional Food Bank to sort and repack products from various stores. We meet at the church to carpool at 2:00 and usually return there around 4:30. No long term commitment, join us whenever your schedule allows. Our next trip is **TUESDAY**, **January 20**<sup>th</sup>.

**Box Tops for Education -** Box tops for education can be found on some cereal boxes, yogurt containers and numerous other containers. If you are not giving yours to a school, please drop them off at church and we will donate them to local schools.

# January 2015 thank you for 2014 service

The Mission Committee thanks you for your participation in the outreach activities of Scotia United Methodist Church in 2014. More people participated in and/or donated to our activities than in previous years. Thank you, thank you, and thank you. Below is a list of some of last year's activities.

#### **SALVATION ARMY LUNCHEONS**

Seven times we provided, prepared and served a lunch at the Salvation Army. Fourteen of us took turns working there. This included four who had not served before. We provided over 1,150 meals.

#### SCHENECTADY INNER CITY MINISTRIES (SICM) SUMMER LUNCH PROGRAM

Once again we served lunches at the SICM location in Hillhurst Park on Campbell Avenue during the week of July 21 - 25. Over the 5 days, 16 adults and 8 youth served 541 children. This includes one adult and three youth who had not served here last year. In addition to meeting the children we interacted with parents and/or guardians.

#### UNION COLLEGE SUMMER LUNCH PROGRAM

Union College ran a summer lunch program at Collins Park for the second time. We served the week of August 11 - 15. Over the 5 days, 11 adults and 12 youth served 153 children. This includes six adults and ten youth who served here for the first time. In addition to meeting the children we interacted with parents and/or guardians.

#### **REGIONAL FOOD BANK**

Once a month we serve at the Regional Food bank by sorting the various donated items into smaller containers for distribution to charities (women shelters, food pantries, etc.). 13 adults and 11 youth were involved with the work.

#### SCOTIA – GLENVILLE FOOD PANTRY

Twice a month our youth collect food and money for the food pantry during service. We also collect refundable containers in our "Bottles-for Bread" campaign. In all, the congregation has donated \$2,534.45 plus refundable containers worth \$392.20 plus 415 pounds of food in the past 12 months.

We also thank the "church mice" for making prayer shawls and baptism quilts. Then there are the "church mice" who work outside the church doors. They volunteer at the various food pantries, the Baptist Retirement Center, the Schenectady school district and Habitat for Humanity. We also have one who teaches math and English at the City Mission of Schenectady.

Last, but definitely not least, we owe a thank you to the Sunday School teachers and the unnamed others who organized and collected for Heifer International, the Children's Christmas shoe boxes, the Crop Hunger Walk, the community wide Halloween party and the intergenerational gingerbread house building. Thank you one and all for your support by your time, talents, donations and your prayers that make Scotia United Methodist Church the place that it is.
