Introducing Carl Shepard

And here I thought I had retired! Actually, I've worked all my life, from the time I was eight years old in North Creek until I retired from ministry at the Alplaus UMC at the end of June this year. Still, I enjoyed playing golf and working during the month of July on the house we bought in Clifton Park. I'm sure I'll enjoy my ¼-time association with Scotia UMC.

So a little about me... I have 4½ college degrees - BS and MS in secondary science education with a physics major, an MS and PhD in physics (all from SUNY Albany), and half way through an MDiv at Andover Newton Theological School in Boston, and a few other assorted courses. I taught high school for 14 years at Newcomb in the Adirondacks (Clarence knows where that is). I worked at SUNY Cobleskill for 20½ years, working my way up through all the academic ranks, department chair, Director, and left there as Assistant Vice-President for Academics. I also have done research in materials science.

Following my career in education, having taken early retirement, I became a licensed local pastor serving first the Broadway UMC, then merging with Fisher to become the Rotterdam UMC where I copastored with Dana Carroll, and spent my final six years at Alplaus UMC. Since Alplaus has done a number of shared worship services with Scotia, I already know a number of people here. It's important that you know, however, that I am not being appointed here by the Conference and so am no longer licensed to be a pastor. For pastoral needs you will need to go to Pastor Margaret.

Beyond my work life, I have been helping with flood recovery in the Schoharie Valley for nearly three years now. I go out every Wednesday and do whatever work is needed - mucking out, scraping mold, framing, sheet rocking, electrical installations, planning projects, supervising crews - you name it and I've probably done it. So they put me on the Board of Directors of the recovery organization (SALT) and have made me a member or chair of six different committees so far. You'll be hearing more about that work from me.

For recreation, I'm an avid though average golfer. And a singer. I've sung with church choirs, community choirs, chamber singers, Electric City Chorus, and even with Albany Pro Musica a couple of times. Currently I sing with a gospel quartet, *The New Messengers*. I hope to bring them to Scotia for a concert.

I look forward to working with the movers and shakers in the congregation. I bring a number of gifts and talents and experiences that I think can be very helpful as you go through the transition from a full-time to part-time pastor and as you pause to re-think how this church can best use its resources to serve God and your community.

Lay Visitation Training

One of the adjustments the church has to make in transitioning from full to part-time clergy is in the visitation program. Simply put, visitation takes a lot of time and will burn out the pastor. One solution is for lay people to step up, form a team, and learn to do the majority of the visitation. There are many reasons why this is not only necessary, but desirable. This does not mean that Pastor Margaret or I will not do any visits but that we will only do ones where a clergy visit is requested, and also, most hospital visits.
