The Story Behind the Hymn

#34 "The Summons" also called "Will You Follow Me"

This is a Scottish Christian hymn written by John L. Bell in 1980, so this is a recent addition to our hymnals. He composed "The Summons" after being accepted into the Iona Community (on the isle of Iona off the coast of Scotland). The Community was started by George MacLeod because he perceived a need for an ecumenical community of men and women to close the gap between the Church of England and working people. It is set to the tune of Kelvingrove, a traditional Scottish melody. Its text contains 13 questions asked by Jesus in the first person. The initial four stanzas with the questions are in Jesus' voice and the fifth stanza is the singer's response to them. The hymn is based on Mark 1:16-20 and alludes to Jesus calling his disciples to follow him.

In 2014 the hymn was used to commemorate 20 years since the first ordination of women in the Church of England. – submitted by Holly Russo

Welcome back! Welcome to those who "took the summer off." You missed some really hot Sundays. Welcome to those who have decided to give Scotia UMC another try. We've missed you. And (I hope) welcome back to me. It's nice to be among you again, even if for a limited time in a limited role.

I've heard from a core of folks who are determined that this church will not only continue but will thrive again. They are committing to brainstorming ideas for transformation, to offering ourselves to the community in new ways, to tending to the current flock even while making additions to it. So far we are planning to form a joint youth group with Alplaus and Faith UMCs. It will have several co-leaders and could involve up to around fifteen young people. We are also scheming how to improve our advertising.

I am thinking of two Bible stories. In Matthew 8:23-27, Mark 4:35-41, and Luke 8:22-25, Jesus is on the Sea of Galilee with his disciples when a storm arises. It must have been a really bad storm as even these seasoned fishermen are panicking, thinking the boat is going down. They have no life boats, no life preservers...or so they think. They awaken the sleeping Master. And he turns out to be their life preserver. He calms the storm and reminds them that they should have had faith.

The second story is a little later in Matthew 14:22-33. The disciples are again caught in a storm on the sea. This time they are facing the storm alone; Jesus is not with them. They are working hard, striving mightily, but they are working against the wind. Jesus comes strolling by, walking on the water. Peter asks if he has that kind of power, too, and at Jesus' invitation also starts walking on the water.

Our church is caught in a storm right now. To some it looks like the boat is sinking and it's time to abandon ship. Some are looking for the life preservers. Some feel they have been rowing against the wind and are getting tired.

We worship a God who has the power to calm the storms of life that afflict us, a Lord who has the power to walk on the water, a God who can even give us the power to walk on water... if we have faith. I invite you to bolster your faith, to stay in the boat, and go on this journey united in our commitment to this church and to one another.
